### Petrolicious Event May 12<sup>th</sup> Bicester Heritage

Petrolicious engages with a youthful, social media savvy audience, the majority of which fall into the 25-34 and 35-44 age ranges. 70% travel more than three times per year, 70% have restored a car, and 65% own three or more cars. ### **BUYING A "CHEAP" ALFA 916 FROM EBAY**

In retirement, August 2018, I decided, since I no longer needed to be anywhere at a specific time, to indulge myself and buy an Alfa 916 Spider as a weekend car. I decided a Twin Spark would be most economical to buy and run.

My first eBay purchase was a red Phase 1, sold with an MOT and a £2000.00 bill for rear suspension overhaul 2000 miles ago by a top specialist. It had a current MOT, but needed paintwork doing due to fading and lacquer lift, but no rust.



Technically the description was accurate, but it handled a little strangely. When I got it home, I found the front tyres had wire sticking out from the inside edges and the paint could be scraped off with an ice scraper. The resulting body shop estimate was £5000.00 (fair as I found out since as I decided to strip it myself). I am now a couple of hundred hours in with different panels having multiple different coats of paint. The original red paint had gone rotten under the lacquer and just blocks up flatting discs - obviously not a quick job! So now, it is under a cover and I spend an hour or two with a DA whenever I have nothing better to do! I could not chemically strip it as bonnet, front wings and hood cover are a form of fibreglass ....a winter project.

I decided to buy another one to do some of the late summer/autumn events, but this time without a paint problem. Found a black one on eBay, fairly local, looking like a nice car. There were no paint problems other than a small crack in the grill surround on the bonnet. I also noticed a cheap manual aerial and the hood had shrunk with the usual problems. But what do you expect on a 20-year-old car? It started and ran,

with a slight misfire but no variator noise. The seller would not allow a test drive for insurance reasons, but since a set of plugs are £80.00 and with no service history other than a bill from a "friend" for a service and a set of plugs for £60.00 and the knowledge that the Twin Spark generally has a good reputation, I decided to go for it.

It overheated and expired on the way home – so I trailered it to an Alfa expert who initially correctly diagnosed a burnt valve, but when the head was off we discovered one cylinder was almost oval and the block was scrap.

It ended up with a full recon engine, new clutch, new alternator, belts, cv boot and a set of tyres (as they were all cracked) - and the MOT was out. Had it back in November 2018 just as the weather changed - took 16 weeks for the work to be done and next year's holiday is now in a tent.

In the meantime, determined to get something out of the summer, I bought Spider number 3 - green this time, clean body with no MOT, but with the failure notice for brakes and emissions. Ever the optimist, I thought "3rd time lucky". It had to be cheap as pension could not afford an expensive one and as I used to run a workshop 30 years ago, thought I could do it myself. Pads and discs are cheap and Halfords sell a money back MOT emissions fixer for a few pounds. The car was cheap, but 170 miles away so had it picked up by a transport contractor.

It started and ran but would create a smoke screen a destroyer would be proud of.

It did not seem to use oil or water. I checked for head gasket with fluorescent dye in the coolant and combustion gases check in header tank - Alfa experts suggested may be sucking hydraulic fluid from servo, but eliminated all that. Then the penny dropped - when do you buy a car off eBay with a full tank of fuel? Somebody had put diesel in it! I drained it off, but there were cat and lambda scrap and other electrical issues due to damp as it had been stored for some time. After fresh fuel, smoke problem still existed, not as bad but still not usable, so another winter project emerged!



I just hope the experts are correct and these cars are going up in value.

Moral of the story - if you want a 916, do not be a cheapskate, buy a proper one with a good service history from a genuine owner that has cherished it and give it a good inspection and road test. Red and silver seem particularly prone to lacquer lift.

Points to look for:

- Original paint: If it has been re-painted, has it been taken back to primer? If not, it will just lift again and paintwork usually costs more than mechanical problems.
- Recent MOT and cam belt/balance shaft belt, preferably with variator change, if not, budget £500.
- Have a good look at tyre wear, particularly front inside edges.
- Lower front wishbone bushes considered a consumable.
- Knocking from rear suspension usually bushes, but if it has been going on a while aluminium subframe can be damaged. This is available second-hand for about £100, but a big job to change it, over £1000 in labour plus parts. It had just been done on my red one which is one of the reasons I went for it.
- Budget for a hood unless it has recently been replaced, they all shrink around the rear window. A place in Kent does them for £600.00 fitted. (All my 3 need hoods). All mine have manual hoods – easy enough to get up and down and I think there are enough potential problems with a 20+ year old car without trying to get an electric hood working.
- In all my 3, the radios were rubbish it was actually the front speakers that rot out to just the chassis!
- Rubber seals round windows etc no longer available, nor small triangular plastic screw cover on front indicator/fog lamps.
- If Phase 1, touch the gear lever and instrument surround if it is sticky, most are, this has to have grotty plastic paint removed and be repainted.
- Make sure that unless you are mechanically adept that you have access to a local Alfa expert - these cars do need looking after and like any mistress are expensive to maintain - very few main dealers were dealers when these cars were current, so specialists are best.
- When I was an apprentice at an Alfa garage almost 60 years ago, we only used Golden Lodge surface discharge plugs as Alfas were plug sensitive - seems they still are, so £80.00 a set it is.
- If you are going to do the diagnostics on ABS, engine and airbags yourself, the Phase one is not OBD, but has separate 3 pin connectors for each control unit I have tried the two most recommended diagnostic programs and connection is variable injector light is on one car and although diagnostics from one system connect, no fault codes found.
- Whatever you do, if you have a flat battery, REMOVE the ignition key before connecting jump leads - if the key is in the ignition when you connect the battery, in all probability the code

light will come on and you are then in real trouble.



Here is the latest update on the black one, which has had a £3000.00 engine rebuild with new clutch, alternator, second hand block, head etc, (the only part from original engine was the crank). I used it to go down to Portland Bill on 24<sup>th</sup> February for my 51<sup>st</sup> wedding anniversary. It used a complete 5 litre can of oil in 350-mile trip. It cost more in oil than petrol. Whilst Alfas traditionally use a little oil, 70 miles per litre of oil seems excessive, so back to the engine builder next week. Saga will be updated in next Newsletter.....!

# AROC COTSWOLD SECTION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING Tuesday February 19<sup>th</sup>, 2019

The committee, chaired by Steve Davies and composing Alex Payne (Secretary), John Mills (Treasurer) and Chris Martin (Web Manager) led the meeting. Apologies were given by Neale Smith (Committee member) and 3 others.

There were 17 others present including two visitors from the West Midlands AROC Section.

### Secretary's Report

Alex explained that the February Newsletter summarised activities throughout the year and remarked on the success of events. One of the highlights was how the membership had also been involved as individuals and individually had attended many events. Cotswold Alfa Day was great and had changed to Saturday as a trial and to accommodate Cotswold Wildlife Park. The venue worked as a family friendly location and although the change of day may not have been everyone's choice, it still attracted 90 plus cars and some new faces.

He noted the change of eligibility rules for Bicester Heritage which needs Club Bookings to include at least 50% pre-90's cars, so the section will not be reserving a pitch this year. Alex thanked the Section for their support throughout the year and said he would be willing to stand again as Secretary.

### **Treasurer's Report**

John circulated a summary of accounts.

He reminded the section that it was possible to claim a subsidy of £50 per month from AROC UK on production of valid receipts. However, AROC UK also encouraged sections to be self-sufficient and to make minimal claims as over claiming by all would severely stretch the AROC UK funds. As a result, the Cotswold Section has this year made only 3 claims of £50, which is the lowest not only in recent years but also since the Section re-formed in 2005.

There are one or two expenses which could not be claimed from AROC, namely the cheque presented to Mike and Carol when they gave up tenancy of the Fox and the donation to Myton Hospice in memory of Malcolm Coulter who passed away last year (Alex represented the Section at the funeral).

The Section paid £71.40 for the hosting of the new website and were able to claim back £50 from AROC UK.

For our chosen Charity Friends of Pershore Hospital, we raised £73 in total.

Our total expenditure for the year was £2077.25. the balance at the beginning of the year was £504.56 and at present is £442.41. The aim of the Section has been to maintain a balance between £450.00 and £500.00 to be available for emergency payments such as printer or events prepayment.

During questions Mark Knight offered to discuss continued sponsorship levels and sharing his web host to reduce costs. Chris Martin would discuss this with Mark at a future point. Derek Mathers queried insurance cover and was advised that AROC UK has protection for Sections and is used, for example, at Cotswold Alfa Day for Public Liability and safety coordination with venues.

### **COMMITTEE NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS**

Steve Davies began by saying that he was willing to stand down as Chair if anyone was interested in taking the role. However, there were no volunteers and the voting proceeded as follows:

Secretary: Alex Payne Re-elected

### **Treasurer post (Vacant)**

Dave Parker had written to the committee expressing interest and was elected. Neville Guibarra had also approached the committee with an interest in supporting with the Treasurer's role. The committee will talk with both Dave and Neville.

Web Manager Chris Martin Re-elected

Committee Member Neale Smith Re-elected

(Non-Committee Newsletter Editor David Slorach to replace Hazel Mills)

Those present were asked if they wished to volunteer to be co-opted on to the committee, but when no-one responded, it was acknowledged that Section members were very good at helping with and organising the programme and events when needed.


